Length: We need both longer and shorter articles. 1000-3000 words is the length to shoot for.

Format: Text should be formatted in Microsoft Word (.doc) or .rtf or .txt. **Name** your text file using your last name (e.g. jones.doc). **Do not** embed images in your article. Send the illustrations for your article as separate .jpg files (no more than 2mb each), named using your last name and the figure number (e.g. "jonesfig1.jpg"). Illustrations must be original or used **by permission** from the source. Provide the **name of your source** for each illustration as they will be listed in the figure captions (e.g. photo by Corina Roberts). Illustrations are an essential part of almost any article. You may include a short byline describing yourself/credentials/role in the hobby.

Subjects: Choose a subject related to model horses in which you are knowledgeable. Here are some examples of the kind of topics we are interested in:

- Performance-the tack, rules, setting, etc. illustrated with photos of real horses/tack and/or model horses.
- Customizing how to ... (paint, resculpt, do hooves, braid a mane, etc.)
- How to make tack a halter, bridle, saddle, costume ...
- How to make props or dolls

Breed Directory update!

If you encounter a breed that is not on the list, please contact Carolyn Bailey or another Board member. This update concerns the Spanish Barb. It belongs in class 25.

>The agile desert bred African Barb horse was crossed with existing Spanish stock to form the Spanish Barb horse.

Judges – Important reminder –

There are a number of "other performance" classes which allow multiple entries. It is important/critical/required that the judge states what the performance is along with the horses name in the results, *even if* only one photo of the horse is entered. This is so the tabulators can record what **horse AND performance** are qualified, as the same horse could qualify a number of times with different performance entries in the "other performance" classes. In addition, for class 119, scene, the name of the scene must be recorded in the results. **Showers:** *make sure you give your scene a unique name*.

Feature: Pinto patterns

This year, in Division A, we have made some permanent splits so that we can recognize more worthy horses in the championship show. One of those splits is in pinto color: 52a, Tobiano/tovero patterns, and 52b, all other patterns. This has really challenged us to understand our pinto patterns!

Like the "leopard" (appaloosa) pattern, "pinto" is a white-added pattern. But while horses with Leopard complex will "varnish" – fade like a grey, over time, pinto patterns are for life (unless there is an additional modifier like grey). How many pinto patterns are there? Genetic testing has shown us that we do not (can not?) ever know. But there are some things we DO know, and they may run counter to what you think you know about white patterns!

White-added patterns involve mutations in the KIT gene complex. This is true for all animals (dogs, cats, cows, etc.). A study involving foxes has shown that domestication rapidly leads to an increased incidence of white patterns (color loss in various patterns) in the captive population. White (or patterned) animals do occur in the wild (e.g. buffalo, deer, giraffes), but they tend to be rare (unless the world turns white, then we make polar

bears!). Nature provides for variability (diversity) to enable a rapid response to environmental change. A domesticated animal is safe from predators, so these mutations become expressed and bred in – often by choice. White patterns are not only pretty, but they are a stamp of individuality which makes it easier to tell animals apart. And that is both desirable and useful. That said, historically, pinto colors are sometimes in fashion and sometimes not!

The earliest pinto pattern known is Tobiano (oops – looks like "Sabino 1" is older). How do they know this: By analyzing extremely old DNA. Tobiano genes entered the population nearly 4000 years ago – not long after chestnut/black and "Sabino 1", and it spread rapidly. Because Tobiano has been in the horse population so long, it occurs in more horse breeds than any other pinto pattern. It is also the least deleterious of the white patterns. The KIT gene is very important to horse growth, development and function. Some mutations are lethal (Homozygous Lethal White, for example). But Tobiano is on a KIT *regulatory* gene (not the KIT gene itself), and it is not associated with any serious medical issues.

The typical Tobiano has 4 white stockings and "white that crosses the back". The extent of markings varies, however, and a minimal Tobiano might have just four white legs, and the white could be as minimal as a white spot at the back of the hoof. At the other extreme, a Tobiano may be completely white EXCEPT for the head. Because Tobiano does not affect the head, face patterns are characteristic of solid-color horses: a star, diamond, or blaze, but not a bald face or white beneath the chin or jaw. The "Tobiano rules", four white stockings, white that crosses the back, and a solid head, are useful for identifying the Tobiano pattern, but they are NOT cast in stone! Sometimes the Tobiano pattern "slips" out of place, and a colored foot/lower leg may be revealed. And, as I mentioned above, the white markings may be so minimal they are easily missed. This occurs in specific breeds (Nordic pony breeds). If you are showing a tobiano horse that has an "uncommon" expression (one which breaks the "rules"), by all means document your entry for the judge.



OF Stone "Calamity" is a good example of a slipped Tobiano pattern, but there are others – such as the Breyerfest SR Wish on a Star and also SR Gathering Storm (both on Big Ben mold). These "Bens" have a dark leg, but they are definitely tobianos.

If your horse is Tobiano, with or without another pinto pattern present, it belongs in MEPSA "color" class 52a. That said, if less than 5% of the horse is white (like those minimal patterns described above), you may show it in its base-color class, such as "47-bay" or "54- dun". White patterns are always additive, so a "tovero" or Tobiano plus an overo pattern will include characteristics that suggest Tobiano, such as white on 4 legs and white across the back, but the face will have more white typical of a sabino, frame, or splash pattern. More patterns can mean more white overall – like a medicine hat pattern. For the purposes of the MEPSA class list, if the pattern INCLUDES Tobiano, the correct class is 52a.

Color pattern identification and some understanding of inheritance patterns has been a "thing" since long before sophisticated genetic analysis, but such understanding is speculative. Genetic technology is revealing a far more complex landscape of white patterns than we ever imagined. All of these non-tobiano patterns are lumped into one color class – "52b. other pinto". These include a broad spectrum of sabino types, several types of "splash white", and frame overo, many of which have not been defined genetically. In addition, there are interactions between various genes that influence how extensive the pattern is. I highly recommend Lesli Kathman's book "The Equine Tapestry" for a more in-depth look at what is currently known about equine color and inheritance.

Take a look at the diagrams showing pattern "origin" and "extent". The pattern origin depicts the parts of the horse that are always affected by the pattern, even in minimal expression. The extent demonstrates different levels of expression. Again, there are many patterns that are not well understood. New patterns are discovered all the time (though they may appear similar to known patterns, their genetic basis, inheritance and expression are new or not known).



This mare is unquestionably a frame overo. She may also have sabino, as suggested by the jagged edges of her pattern and the amount of white on her face and head. Kudos to Breyer for breeding her with a sabino stallion. The foal appears to have not inherited the frame overo pattern. The set was released in the 2017 Vintage Club program.

Frame overo produces white patterns on the sides of the horse, but is lethal when homozygous. It is a very common overo pattern. Splash white originates from the belly and usually also from under the chin, and very commonly produces blue eyes. Sabinos have small jagged patterning, with white on the face and below the chin, and they may have roaning. There are many different sabino-type mutations, and only a few are genetically identified. Many sabino patterns present as white when homozygous. Ever wonder what color the Breyer "silver" is? More than likely, he is homozygous sabino. Since "dominant white" is included in class 56, I would show him there.

One of the more unusual pinto patterns is "Manchado". Manchado can have white across the back, but is not characterized by four white legs. It may also resemble an appaloosa pattern. Manchado was thought to be environmentally induced (somatic) rather than genetic, because it appeared in several breeds in Argentina. Although the genetic basis has still not been identified, it is currently believed to be an inherited pattern. I am not aware of this pattern appearing on an OF mold other than a Lakeshore SR on the Status Symbol mold.

I hope this article helps you to place your pinto into the right color class. If you still have questions, feel free to post a picture of your model on Facebook and tag me. I'll be happy to help you "class"ify your horse!
